



GAMBLING ACT 2005

GUIDANCE TO APPLICANTS

Introduction

The document is intended to offer guidance and information on the different licence types and processes to new applicants. It provides the basic information for applicants to help make a successful application. The contents are provided as an information guide only. They are not a full and authoritative statement of the law and do not constitute professional or legal advice.

East Staffordshire Borough Council has produced a separate policy which applicants should read and understand. The Licensing Policy explains what East Staffordshire Borough Council considers important when determining applications. This policy also explains how the Council expects applicants to meet the Licensing Objectives. When determining applications the Council can only consider matters that will impact on one or more of these objectives.

Premises licences, once granted, will last for the life of the business provided that there are no changes applied for, or it is reviewed, revoked or surrendered. It will therefore not need to be renewed annually, although an annual fee will be payable.

The Gambling Act 2005

The Gambling Act 2005 (the Act) came into force on 01 September 2007. The act repealed the Betting, Gaming and Lotteries Act 1963, the Gaming Act 1968 and the Lotteries and Amusement Act 1976.

The Act covers two main activities:

- Providing facilities for gambling
- Using premises for gambling

The Act contains three licensing objectives that underpin the legislation:

- Preventing gambling from being a source of crime and disorder, being associated with crime or disorder, or being used to support crime.
- Ensuring that gambling is conducted in a fair and open way.
- Protecting children and other vulnerable people from being harmed or exploited by gambling.

The Act transferred responsibility for granting gaming and betting permissions from Licensing Justices and granted new powers to licensing authorities in relation to the licensing and regulation of the use of gambling premises. East Staffordshire Borough Council will be responsible for the licensing of premises where gambling activities are to take place by issuing premises licences. East Staffordshire Borough Council are also responsible for Temporary Use Notices, Occasional Use Notices and Permits.

Personal licences and Operating licences

Personal licences are issued to a person with key operational functions connected with the gambling business. A company cannot hold a licence. These licences are issued by the Gambling Commission and it is their responsibility to decide which person requires a licence. Personal licences are of unlimited duration, you will not need to apply again unless your circumstances change. A periodic maintenance fee is payable to the Gambling Commission in respect of personal licences.

Operating licences

Anyone who provides or wishes to provide: facilities for gambling and/or to manufacture, supply install, repair or adapt a gaming machine or gambling software (unless an exception applies), must apply for an operating licence, unless an exemption applies.

Examples include: anyone operating a casino, providing facilities for bingo, betting, pool betting, acting as a betting intermediary, making gaming machines available for use in adult gaming centres or family entertainment centres, manufacturing, supplying, installing, adapting, maintaining or repairing a gaming machine, part of a gaming machine, or gambling software, promoting a lottery.

Operating licences are of unlimited duration, you will not have to apply again unless your circumstances change. You will be required to pay an annual fee to the Gambling Commission in respect of your Operating Licence.

You need to apply to the Gambling Commission for your Operating Licences and for the appropriate personal licences required by your business.

Gambling Act Premises Licence

A Premises Licence is required for any premises where it is intended to provide gambling facilities. The types of Licence available are as follows:

- Casino Premises Licence
- Bingo Premises Licence
- Adult Gaming Centre Premises Licence (For over 18's only enabling Category B3 gaming machines and an unlimited number of Category C and D to be made available for use at the premises)

- Family Entertainment Centre Premises Licence (enabling Category C and D gaming machines to be made available for use at the premises)
- Betting Premises Licence (enabling the provision of facilities for betting, by making or accepting bets or by acting as a betting intermediary)

Except in the case of a track, a Premises Licence may not authorise the use of premises for activities of more than one of the types listed above. A Licence may not be issued in respect of premises if those premises already have a Premises Licence in effect.

In addition, there are Unlicensed Family Entertainment Centres, which only need a Permit but are limited to making available Category D gaming machines. (See annex 1 for gaming machine categories)

An application for a Premises Licence may only be made by persons (which includes companies or partnerships):-

- who have the right to occupy the premises; and
- who have an Operating Licence which allows him/her to carry out the proposed activity, or have applied for an Operating Licence (the Premises Licence may only be issued once the Operating Licence has been issued) from the Gambling Commission
- over the age of 18.

It should be noted that “premises” includes ‘any place’ in particular vehicles and vessels.

When applying to the Licensing Authority for a premises licence the following must be submitted:-

- A completed premises licence application form;
- A plan of the premises which includes some basic information about the situation and layout of the premises;
- The prescribed application fee.

Once you have sent your completed application, with all the necessary documentation to the Licensing Section and the notices to the statutory consultees, the statutory consultees then have 28 days to make any representations to the Licensing Section. You will also have to advertise your application (if varying or applying for a new licence), allowing interested parties an opportunity to comment on your application.

Any representations received must relate to one of the three licensing objectives. The council can reject any representations that are vexatious or frivolous.

If representations are received you will be notified of them. If this is the case, the application will have to go to a committee hearing to hear all the facts of the matter and make a decision.

You will be notified of any hearings and given the opportunity to attend in person.

Casinos

To operate a **Casino**, you will need an operating licence, issued by the Gambling Commission, a premises licence, issued by the East Staffordshire Borough Council, and a personal licence – issued by the Gambling Commission. Application forms are available from both the Gambling Commission and East Staffordshire Borough Council.

Bingo Halls

To operate a **Bingo club**, you will need an operating licence, issued by the Gambling Commission, a premises licence, issued by the East Staffordshire Borough Council, and a personal licence – issued by the Gambling Commission. Application forms are available from both the Gambling Commission and East Staffordshire Borough Council.

Bingo operating, premises and personal licence will be of unlimited duration you will not need to apply again unless your circumstance change.

You will, however, be required to pay an annual fee to the Gambling Commission in respect of the operating licence and to East Staffordshire Borough Council in respect of the premises licence. You will also be required to pay a periodic maintenance fee to the Gambling Commission in respect of any personal licences.

Adult Gaming Centres

Adult Gaming Centres will be able to offer up to four category B3 gaming machines and also an unlimited number of Category C and D machines. (See Annex 1 for gaming machine categories)

Adult Gaming Centres will be strictly for over 18's and children will not be allowed in any part of the premises.

If you wish to operate an arcade where children are allowed on the premises then you will need to refer to the information relating to **Family Entertainment Centres**.

If you wish to operate an Adult Gaming Centre under the Gambling Act 2005, you will need to hold the following licences:

- An Operating Licence issued by the Gambling Commission
- A Premises Licence issued by East Staffordshire Borough Council
- Any Personal Licences relevant to your business, issued by the Gambling Commission

Adult Gaming Centres operating, premises and personal licences will be of unlimited duration. You will not need to apply again unless your circumstances change.

You will, however, be required to pay an annual fee to the Gambling Commission in respect of the operating licence and to East Staffordshire Borough Council in respect of the premises licence. You will also be required to pay a periodic maintenance fee to the Gambling Commission in respect of any personal licences.

Family Entertainment Centres

Licensed Family Entertainment Centres will be able to offer an unlimited number of category C & D gaming machines. Unlike, Adult Gaming Centres, children will be allowed to enter the premises and will be able to gamble on category D machines. Any category C machines on the premises **must** only be located in 'over-18' areas. (See annex 1 for gaming machine categories)

Should you wish to only offer category D gaming machines please see details below regarding **Unlicensed Family Entertainment Centres**.

To operate a Licensed Family Entertainment Centre you will need:

- An Operating Licence issued by the Gambling Commission
- A Premises Licence issued by East Staffordshire Borough Council
- Any Personal Licences relevant to your business, issued by the Gambling Commission

Family Entertainment Centre operating, premises and personal licences will be of unlimited duration. You will not need to apply again unless your circumstances change.

You will, however, be required to pay an annual fee to the Gambling Commission in respect of the operating licence and to East Staffordshire Borough Council in respect of the premises licence. You will also be required to pay a periodic maintenance fee to the Gambling Commission in respect of any personal licences.

Unlicensed Family Entertainment Centres

Unlicensed Family Entertainment Centres will be able to offer an unlimited number of Category D gaming machines. Children will be able to enter these premises and will be able to gamble on the Category D machines. (See annex 1 for gaming machine categories)

To operate an unlicensed family entertainment centre, you will need:

- A Family Entertainment Centre Gaming Permit issued by East Staffordshire Borough Council

You will not require an Operating Licence or any Personal Licences.

Family Entertainment Gaming Machine Permits will be granted for ten years. There is no annual fee.

Betting Shops

To operate a betting shop you will need:

- A non-remote general betting operating licence, issued by the Gambling Commission,

- A betting premises licence, issued by East Staffordshire Borough Council,
- Any personal licences required by your business, issued by the Gambling Commission.

If you also wish to operate any remote services you will also need to apply to the Gambling Commission for a remote operating licence.

Betting operating, premises and personal licences will be of unlimited duration you will not need to apply again unless your circumstances change. You will, however, be required to pay an annual fee to the Gambling Commission in respect of the operating licence(s) and to East Staffordshire Borough Council in respect of the premises licence. You will also be required to pay a periodic maintenance fee to the Gambling Commission in respect of the personal licences.

Lotteries

Society lotteries are lotteries established for the benefit of a non-commercial society. A Society is non-commercial if it is established and conducted:

- For charitable purposes
- To enable participation in, or to support, sports, athletic or cultural activities; or
- For any other non-commercial purpose other than private gain.

A society must hold a **lottery operating licence issued by the gambling commission** if the total proceeds exceed £20,000 or £250,000 in cumulative lotteries in one calendar year. If the proceeds are below these levels, the society must register with East Staffordshire Borough Council as a **Small Society Lottery**.

If you wish to sell lottery tickets and receive payments by means of remote communication, ie not face to face but via telephone, fax or over the internet, you will need to apply for a **remote gambling operating licence** in addition to a lottery operating licence from the Gambling Commission.

Societies will be subject to an annual fee which will become payable on the anniversary of the grant of the original licence. Local Authorities will be given powers to cancel registrations where an annual fee is not paid.

Tracks

If you just want to operate a track and will not provide your own betting facilities, you only need to apply for a **premises licence**.

If you are going to provide your own betting facilities, you will also need the appropriate **operating** and **personal** licences.

If you offer pool betting at your dog track, you will need a **pool betting operating** licence and you may also need a **personal** licence.

If you are a point-to-point track, you *are not* required to have a premises licence – instead you should ask the Licensing Authority about occasional use notices, which allow betting on a track up to eight times per year.

If you are an on-course bookmaker:

You will need a general betting **operating licence**, and

You, or those working for you, may also need a **personal licence**.

However, you may qualify for a small-scale operator exemption, which means you will not need a personal licence. You do not need a **premises licence**.

For further information regarding exemptions and Operating and Personal Licences you need to contact the Gambling Commission.

Gaming Machines

The 'A' Category gaming machines will **only** be allowed in a Regional Casino. The Category B1-B4 gaming machines will only be allowed in premises, with a Premises Licences, and what is allowed in terms of machine type and numbers varies for each type of Premises Licence. (See annex 1 for gaming machine categories)

Gaming Machine Permits – Licensed Premises

An existing Section 34 permit will continue to have effect as if it were a licensed premises gaming machine permit issued under the new Act.

Under the Gambling Act, pubs will have an automatic entitlement to two gaming machines (Category C or D), subject to a simple notification procedure to this Authority. This should be done prior to the expiry of the existing Section 34 permit. (See annex 1 for gaming machines categories)

Should you wish to offer more than two gaming machines you will need to apply for a **licensed premises gaming machine permit**. This should be done prior to the expiry of the existing Section 34 permit.

The automatic entitlement and licensed premises gaming machine permit will be of unlimited duration. You will not need to apply again unless your circumstances change. If the Premises Licence issued under the Licensing Act 2003, is transferred you will need to submit another notification or apply to transfer the existing licensed premises gaming machine permit.

Holders of licensed premises gaming machine permits will be required to pay an annual fee.

It is important to note that this section relates to premises with an 'on-premises' alcohol licence issued under the Licensing Act 2003 that authorises the sale of alcohol without the requirement to serve food.

Pubs, restaurant or hotels will be able to notify/apply for a permit, but only if they have a bar. Hotels and restaurants that are only permitted to sell alcohol as an accompaniment to food **will not** be able to provide gaming machines on the premises.

Club Gaming Permits

Club Gaming Permit – entitles clubs to offer up to three in total, of any combination of category B4, C or D machines*, plus facilities for equal chance gaming (subject to certain limits). (See annex 1 for gaming machine categories)

If the club is run as a commercial club, please see the section on **Club Machine Permits**.

You will need to apply for a permit under the new Act prior to the expiry of your existing registration.

Providing you submit your application before the existing licence expires you will qualify for continuation rights, meaning you will be able to continue offering gaming facilities until your application is resolved.

The new permit will last for ten years and a renewal fee will apply at the end of this period. Holders of this type of permit will also be required to pay an annual fee to the Licensing Authority.

Club Machine Permits

Club Machine Permit – entitles clubs to offer up to three in total, of any combination of category B4, C or D machines*. (See annex 1 for gaming machine categories)

If you are a members club and also wish to offer facilities for equal chance gaming and prescribed gaming, please see the section on **Club Gaming Permits**.

You will need to apply for a permit under the new Act prior to the expiry of your existing registration.

Providing you submit your application before the existing licence expires you will qualify for continuation rights, meaning you will be able to continue offering gaming facilities until your application is resolved.

The new permit will last for ten years and a renewal fee will apply at the end of this period. Holders of this type of permit will also be required to pay an annual fee to the Licensing Authority.

Prize Gaming Permit

Prize gaming is where there is a prize, which is not determined by the number of people participating or the amount paid or raised by the gaming.

For new applications, the applicant will need to demonstrate that they occupy or propose to occupy the premises. There cannot be a Premises Licence or Club Gaming Permit in place at the premises

Temporary Use Notices

These will allow the use of premises for gambling where there is no **Premises Licence** but where a gambling operator wishes to use the premises temporarily for providing facilities for gambling. Premises that might be suitable for a Temporary Use Notice (TUN) would include hotels, conference centres, and sporting venues.

A TUN may only be granted to a person or company holding a relevant Operating Licence issued by the **Gambling Commission** (for example, the holder of a Betting Operating Licence could apply to provide betting facilities at a snooker tournament).

The same set of premises may not be the subject of a TUN for more than 21 days in any 12-month period, but may be the subject of several Notices provided that the total does not exceed 21 days.

Should this period be exceeded we will issue a counter-notice that has the effect of stopping the TUN coming into effect; failure to comply with the counter-notice will be an offence.

Occasional Use Notices

These Notices will provide that where there is betting on a track on 8 days or less in a calendar year, betting maybe permitted by way of an Occasional Use Notice (OUN) without the need for a full **Premises Licence**.

The use of such Notices will be for where the event upon which the betting is to take place is of a temporary, infrequent nature. The use of such a Notice dispenses with the need for a betting **Premises Licence** for the track in question.

There is no fee for an Occasional Use Notice.

Plans

All plans have to show:

- (a) the extent of the boundary or perimeter of the premises;
- (b) where the premises include, or consist of, one or more buildings, the location of any external or internal walls of each such building;
- (c) where the premises form part of a building, the location of any external or internal walls of the building which are included in the premises;
- (d) where the premises are a vessel or a part of a vessel, the location of any part of the sides of the vessel, and of any internal walls of the vessel, which are included in the premises;
- (e) the location of each point of entry to and exit from the premises, including in each case a description of the place from which entry is made or to which the exit leads.

Premises Licences with the below activities also have to show the following additional items:

Casinos

- (a) the principal entrance to the premises of those identified in accordance with paragraph (6)(a) above;
- (b) the location and extent of any part of the premises which will be a table gaming area;
- (c) the location and extent of any other part of the premises which will be used for providing facilities for gambling in reliance on the Licence; and
- (d) the location and extent of any part of the premises which will be a non-gambling area.

Bingo

- (a) the location and extent of any part of the premises which will be used to provide facilities for gaming in reliance on the Licence (other than those parts which include Category B or C gaming machines);
- (b) the location and extent of any part of the premises in which Category B or C gaming machines will be made available for use in reliance on the Licence;

- (c) the nature and location of any barrier or other thing separating any part of the premises in which Category B or C gaming machines will be made available for use from any other part of the premises.

Adult Gaming Centre

- (a) the location and extent of any part of the premises in which gaming machines will be made available for use in reliance on the Licence.

Family Entertainment Centre

- (a) the location and extent of any part of the premises in which Category C gaming machines will be made available for use in reliance on the Licence;
- (b) the location and extent of any part of the premises in which Category D gaming machines will be made available for use in reliance on the Licence and
- (c) the nature and location of any barrier or other thing separating any part of the premises in which Category C gaming machines will be made available for use from any other part of the premises.

Betting (other than a track)

- (a) the location and extent of any part of the premises which will be used to provide facilities for gambling in reliance on the Licence.

Betting (in respect of a track)

- (a) the location and extent of any part of the premises which is a five times rule betting area;
- (b) the location and extent of any other parts of the premises which will be used for providing facilities for betting in reliance on the Licence;
- (c) the location and extent of any part of the premises in which Category B or C gaming machines will be made available for use in reliance on the Licence;
- (d) the nature and location of any barrier or other thing separating any part of the premises in which Category B or C gaming machines will be made available for use from any other part of the premises.

Publishing a notice

Applicants are also required to publish notice of their application and to notify the responsible authorities and other persons (interested parties) of their application.

This process enables representations to be made and considered by the licensing authority. Notice must be given using the relevant notice forms and must be given in the following ways:-

- Publish notice in a newspaper or newsletter of local relevance, at least once within 10 days of the application being made.
- Publish notice outside the premises in a place where it can be conveniently read and is clearly visible.

- Notice must be copied to all responsible authorities within 7 days of the application being made.

The notice period must last for 28 consecutive days, during which time representations can be given to the Licensing Authority in writing.

Annual fees

The first annual fee for the Licence has to be paid 30 days after the licence has been granted.

Where a Licence specifies that it is to come into effect on an effective date then the first annual fee for that Licence shall be paid within:

- (a) the relevant period, or
- (b) 12 months, after the issue date, whichever is sooner.

The annual fee in subsequent years is payable before the anniversary of the grant of the original licence.

Consultation with relevant authorities for Premises Licence applications

All new or variation applications require the applicant to formally consult with 'responsible authorities' (specified below). This means that a notice must be served on each of them within 7 days of the application being submitted to the Licensing Authority. The **applicant** must do this and prove that this has occurred.
