# 1. Purpose of the Report

1.1. To seek approval for the draft Homelessness Strategy (Appendix 1), which has been informed by the Homelessness Review (Appendix 2).

#### 2. **Executive Summary**

2.1. The Homelessness Strategy is a strategy for avoiding homelessness, securing the availability of accommodation, and for providing support.<sup>1</sup>

#### 3. Background

- 3.1. The Council is required under the Homelessness Act 2002<sup>2</sup> to adopt a new Homelessness Strategy every 5 years, and our current strategy is now due for renewal.
- 3.2. The legislation requires that the Homelessness Strategy be based on the results of a Homelessness Review. The results of the Homelessness Review are set out in the document at Appendix 2.

### 4. Contribution to Corporate Priorities

4.1. Standing up for our communities

#### 5. The Homelessness Strategy 2023 - 2028

- 5.1. The draft strategy recommends that the Council maintain its commitment to delivering a high standard of homelessness service, for example by working closely with DLUHC's Specialist Advisor Team and focusing on the 'key themes' they have identified as being important. However there a number of points to highlight as follows:
  - 5.1.1. The draft strategy is 15 pages long and is therefore concise, so it should be read in conjunction with the Homelessness Review which provides more detail on the activities listed in the strategy.
  - 5.1.2. The issue of single homelessness and rough sleeping is given specific attention in the strategy, recognising the work that is being undertaken in this area.
  - 5.1.3. An action plan for implementation is to be produced annually, in recognition of the changing landscape in homelessness.
- 5.2. Before adopting a homelessness strategy the Council is required to consult such public or local authorities, voluntary organisations or other persons as it considers appropriate. The Council consulted for 4 weeks in respect of the Review and the Strategy, with a few responses being received in each case. The responses have been used to further refine both documents.
- 5.3. The draft strategy also references the 631 units of affordable housing that have been delivered between 2017 and 2022, however the forthcoming Annual Monitoring Report also identifies a further 233 units for 2022/23, which is significantly in excess of the annual requirement of 112 units, demonstrating that the area is currently providing more affordable housing than is required.

#### 6. Financial Considerations

- 6.1. The Council has a number of statutory duties to provide temporary accommodation for homeless residents and to help prevent homelessness.
- 6.2. The Homelessness and Rough Sleeping strategy sets out the method and criteria by which the Council will deliver its statutory duties around homelessness and the prevention of homelessness. Demand levels to deliver these statutory duties are mainly be driven by external factors, such as the economy, housing costs and demography. This means the level of demand in each financial year can be uncertain and volatile.

6.3. The cost of delivering the Council's statutory duties is funded from Council revenue budgets as well as a number of specific revenue grants from the Government.

#### 7. Risk Assessment and Management

7.1. The main risks to this Report and the Council achieving its objectives are as follows:

# 7.2. **Positive** (Opportunities/Benefits):

- 7.2.1. The draft strategy is the product of consultation with partners and stakeholders, and they did not identify any concerns about the Council's services.
- 7.2.2. The strategy identifies ways in which the Council can intervene early to avoid or prevent homelessness.

### 7.3. **Negative** (Threats):

- 7.3.1. The draft strategy does not contain new spending commitments and it may be criticised for that.
- 7.4. The risks do not need to be entered in the Risk Register. Any financial implications to mitigate against these risks are considered above.

#### 8. **Legal Considerations**

- 8.1. The main legal issues arising from this Report are as follows:
  - 8.1.1. By s1 Homelessness Act 2002, all local housing authorities must formulate a homelessness strategy, at least every 5 years.
  - 8.1.2. Under Section 2, the Authority must conduct a review of the levels and future levels of homelessness in its district, consider the activities to combat homelessness, and the resources available.
  - 8.1.3. After completing the Review the results must be made available in the Council's principal office and copies made available for the public.
